

YESTERDAY & TODAY





Today, we continue our legacy by assisting newly arrived refugees with finding housing, employment, and medical care as they adjust to their new environments. Our collaborative work in 2023 for volunteer training and in-kind donations with the International Rescue Committee (IRC) of LA and Interfaith Refugee & Immigrant Service (IRIS) further strengthened this assistance. We also offer case management services to survivors of human trafficking and unaccompanied minors, and legal aid to asylum seekers and other immigrants looking to begin new lives in the U.S. as contributing members of their communities. We give hope to children and families by providing accessible, quality early childhood education, childcare, and nutritious, kid-friendly meals, as well as support low-income individuals in growing and thriving through our social services.











CHILD DEVELOPMENT

For many families, the high cost, limited availability, or inconvenient hours of child care centers can present major barriers to work. Through our child care centers and subsidized programs, the Child Development Division (CDD) provides the flexibility that is vital for parents working nontraditional hours, looking for a job, going to school, or looking for housing. Services are offered at little to no cost to families in the LA area. IILA administers voucher-based programs that reimburse the cost of child care for families with children through age of 13, in settings that include licensed care, family, friend, or neighbor. We also operate nine part-day and full-day state-funded preschool programs that support children of all abilities. Additionally, we partner with providers through our Family Child Care Home Education Network (FCCHEN) for educational enrichment services in a home setting. Our centers also receive daily deliveries of breakfast, lunch, and snacks made fresh by our Nutrition Division to promote healthy development.



The school's services have helped me keep my job. I am at peace knowing that my daughter is in good hands. Similarly, it has helped her gain independence and learn to share with others.



IMMIGRATION LEGAL SERVICES

The Immigration Legal Services Division (ILSD) seeks justice for all immigrants—documented and undocumented—by serving the immigrant community with programs that assist applicants with obtaining relief under immigration laws. In 2023, ILSD began implementing services through a grant from the Acacia Center for Justice to serve unaccompanied children in refugee shelters. ILSD was awarded an LA County Capacity Strengthening Grant that enables us to assist asylum seekers with case management services.

IILA's Afghan Legal Representation Project team members describe one client's journey:

Our client's family fought for the right of girls to go to school and her father donated land so that a free girls' school could be built. She was at work at the Afghan Ministry of Communications and Information Technology with her infant daughter in 2019 when a suicide bomber set off an explosion and armed men began shooting. Our client was afraid to return to work, but she did so to provide for her family...

...Then in 2021, the bus that she normally took to work was bombed. Luckily, she did not go to work that day. In August, her mother, sister, husband and four young children were able to escape from Afghanistan when it fell to the Taliban. Unfortunately, another sister was attacked by the Taliban at the airport and was not able to escape. The family is dedicated to finding a way for this sister to join them in the United States.

SUPPORTIVE SERVICES

The Supportive Services of IILA's Local Integration & Family Empowerment (LIFE) Division support low-income working families and individuals in Los Angeles by increasing access to basic services, connecting communities to resources, and ensuring that economic opportunities are available and accessible to all people.

We partner with other county providers to offer a variety of services, including transportation assistance and fare subsidies enrollment, an on-the-job skills training program, and utilities program assistance for consumers who are not proficient in English. In 2023, we also provided light case management to any person or family impacted by COVID-19, held free vision care events, and distributed grocery vouchers on behalf of the county.
